The Rev'd Carol Latimer, All Souls Group shares this thought from the Focolare Movement: 'We do not know how long this emergency will last: it may be weeks or months. However it will pass. The world we will find at the end of the tunnel is the one we are building now.'

The Rev'd Dr Michael Paterson, CMD Coordinator writes 'In the information tsunami that the Coronavirus has unleashed, one of the most helpful things I have come across is this invitation 'In the rush to return to normal, use this time to consider which parts of normal are worth rushing back to.' I, welcome that as an invitation to catch the questions that this time raises rather to engage in the premature hermeneutics that would soothe our helplessness and give us back some kind of control. For me some of the questions I want to catch are 'what is working well now, or perhaps even better than ever before?'; 'in what ways are our lives and ministries actually being enriched and not only impeded by lockdown?'; 'what would I/we miss if lockdown were lifted tomorrow?'

At root, the question that teases me most right now is a missiological question which goes like this: 'what are we as church willing to do to join those with whom we are not usually in contact who are currently joining us online once this is over? Business as usual says 'we (church) have a gospel to proclaim' but this is not business as usual. What good news, what gospel do these people have to offer us – as church – and how far are we willing to go to join them and find out where they itch, what their stories are and how they can teach US to be worthy of their trust? Once lockdown is over, I doubt if any of them who turn up on a Sunday morning will find no room at the inn but what if they don't join us , will we roll up our sleeves and join them?

The Rev'd Eddie Sykes Rosyth Methodist & Episcopalian Partnership sent in this thought on Rehearsed Gratitude by Rev. Dr. Michael Wilson, Charleswood United Church, Winnipeg. 'The community of faith. [is] a group of people who rehearse gratitude. Not simply for the good things in life for which thanksgiving comes easily and naturally, but a community of people who desire to develop the capacity within ourselves to be thankful in times of sorrow and adversity. ... Among religious communities where the hungry are fed, the stranger is welcomed, and the mournful find comfort, there is a rehearsal of the gratitude we feel for the grace we have received and that we can then share with others. This rehearsal has, I believe, helped us prepare for this moment and this crisis.... When we rehearse gratitude ... when we practice giving thanks week after week on days that we laugh and on days that we cry — we are preparing ourselves for a time like this pandemic. Even when things are hard, like now, gratitude can abound deeply in hearts that have been rehearsing for a time like this?

The Rev'd Canon Dr Iain Macritchie, Lead Chaplain at the Louisa Jordan field hospital in Glasgow and Programme Director for Spiritual Care NHS Scotland reflects on the Road to Emmaus and writes: "I've been travelling today with the thought of those Emmaus disciples getting up "in that very hour" and going back to Jerusalem with the good news that they had known Jesus in the broken bread. "That very hour" would have been well past dark by then. So I'm thinking of what it means to travel in the pitch dark with the good news of the resurrection still setting our hearts on fire."
